### Outrage at the pump

#### Drivers' anger rises as prices creep over \$4 a gallon

Industry analysts said the cost of gasoline might have peaked over the Memorial Day weekend, but prices shot up another 6 cents from last week - to just shy of the \$4 mark.

And that has motorists in the Attleboro area fuming.

"It's outrageous. I didn't want to stop here, but I'm on empty," said Deborah Walsh of Canterbury, N.H., who travels across New England on a daily basis assisting radiologists.

Walsh stopped at the Shell gas station on South Avenue in Attleboro, where the price of regular gas was \$3.95 per gallon.

"I'm waiting for it to hit \$5, then I'm going to learn to ride a motorcycle," she said. A statewide survey Monday by AAA Southern New England found an average price of \$3.96 per gallon for self-serve regular, up from \$3.90 last week.

The state's average has risen 77 cents per gallon over the last six weeks and is a penny a gallon below the national average.

The survey found prices as high as \$4.19 to as low as \$3.84 in the state

Anthony Gallucci of Warwick, R.I., said he tries to save on gas by commuting with his wife when he can, but said that's tough because their schedules do not always match up.

Corrine Beckwith, 21, traveling with Chris McGrath, 23, said the two often travel in Beckwith's more fuel efficient vehicle instead of McGrath's Jeep, which McGrath said is not fuel-efficient and costs about \$80 to fill.

Brad Kirby of Attleboro was not in a pleasant mood fueling his Nissan Frontier, which he said gets about 18 miles per gallon.

"I think it's ridiculous. Gas is not a frivolous thing, it's a basic necessity," he said. "The fat cats are getting rich off of middle-income people trying to get to work."

Walsh was inclined to agree.

"It's a monopoly and all about politics," she said. "We're stuck. As an everyday person there's nothing we can do."

Until the recent spike in prices, the state's record price was \$3.23 per gallon, set in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in 2005. A year ago at this time, the average stood at \$3.03. Diesel prices also rose 3 cents this week to \$4.91.
