#### North Attleboro Veterans Agent James McCann, 60, who served with the Army's 82nd Airborne Division in Vietnam from 1968 to 1969:

"The Fourth of July is the moment where each of us should pause and remember the rebirth of democracy. It should be a great moment of reflection and joy. It's a time of rejoicing that the human spirit is protected by the freedoms of democracy. I think a lot of that is lost today."
