### At \$4.10 a gallon, a twenty doesn't get you very much

Gas prices are on the rise again and area drivers paying more at the pump have noticed the needle on their vehicles' fuel gauge rising less than it used to.

"Last year, when I bought this car, \$20 would fill the tank," now \$20 only fills the tank about halfway, Nick Smith of Fall River said while gassing up at the Gas Plus on Pleasant Street in Attleboro.

"It's totally ridiculous," said Jesse Sanders of Rehoboth, who said he spent only \$10 or \$15 a week on gas last year.

Now, he said he needs at least \$30 to make it through the week.

And George Blais of Attleboro, a delivery man for Papa Gino's, said gas costs him \$40 to \$60 a week. "It goes quick. It's \$12 just to get through a Friday night's deliveries," said Blais, who estimated he spends double or triple the \$20 per week gas cost last year.

After holding steady for three weeks, the average cost of self-serve, regular gasoline in Massachusetts jumped 2 cents from last week to \$4.08 per gallon, according to a statewide survey Monday by AAA of Southern New England.

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Consumers getting less bang for their buck at gas stations must also budget for rising prices elsewhere.

"It's killing me," said Rhonda Chauncey of Attleboro, who said she spends about \$80 on gas each week. "I don't know what's killing me more though, gas prices or groceries."

Coupled with a slowing economy, residents are making sacrifices to use less gas and weather the rising cost of living.

"We don't go out to each as much," said Mike Lewis of Taunton.

Lewis said last year he spent about \$30 per week on gas, but even though he drives less now, gas still costs him \$60 to \$70 a week, now.

"It's outrageous that they think people can afford these gas prices in this economy," said passenger Rachel St. Pierre, who stopped to fuel up with driver Lacey Binns.

St. Pierre and Binns of Attleboro said they each spend about twice as much on gas as they did last summer.

Prior to this week's increase, gas prices had held steady for three consecutive weeks after 10 straight weeks of rising prices. Massachusetts is about 2 cents below the national average of \$4.10, AAA says.
